MOBILIZATION ORDER GIVEN

and stated: "Lobenstein at Shanghai, Penna at Pekin."
Rev. E. C. Lobenstein was stationed at Nankin, but escaped to Shanghai. The cable also stated: "No word received from Pekin or Pao Tia Fu and Wei Hen mission burned. Missionaries safe."
Berlin, June 28.—The commander of the German squadron at Taku telegraphs under date June 26 as follows: "Foreign ministers with landing force."
The Vorwaerts says: "From an absolutely reliable source we hear that the Russian war ministry has sent to all military and civil authorities in Russia secret orders to prepare everything for mobilization. The orders bear date June 18 and 19."
Hamburg, June 28.—Commercial firms have received telegrams from Shanghai saying that all Germans at Tien Tsin are unharmed.
Chicago, June 28.—General Chaffee, en route to China as commandant of the American forces in the flowery kingdom, arrived here today and repaired to the Union League club as its guest. Chaffee declined to be interviewed. During the forenoon he called on General Wheeler at army headquarters.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE A. AND M.

TO BE HELD BY SUPERINTENDENT VENABLE IN JULY.

County Superintendent Venable has received a letter from President Winston of the A. & M. college, Raleigh, in which he says:

"We are anxious to make this college instrumental in the industrial development of North Carolina. We desire to give our boys such training as will make them skilled workmen and enable them to add to their own wealth and that of the community by skilled labor."

"If you will send me the name of any bright needy lad of energy and character I will try to help him to secure an education here."

"To save lads the expense of coming here to stand entrance examinations, we wish to have entrance examinations conducted in each county of the state on Saturday, July 28. I hope that you will conduct the examinations for us in your county."

Superintendent Venable will comply with the request and will hold the examinations next month and, as is customary with him, will make no charge for the service, although he has the right to do so.

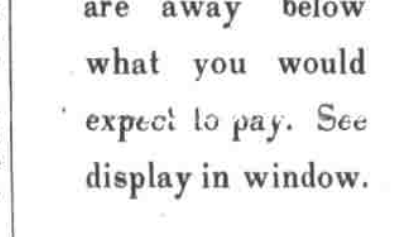
