SPECIAL COMMITTEES ON PROGRAM AND ENTERTAINMENT.

The second largest and probably the most select and cultured medical society of the United States will convene at Asheville the first week of October next, by invitation of the Buncombe County Medical Society. Last fall Drs. Baird, Fletcher, Minor, Glenn, Morris, Meriwether and Reynolds, under the chairmanship of Dr. Paquin, an old member of the Mississippi Valley Medical Association, went in a body to the Chicago meeting of this association and by hard work secured the next convention against all competitors.

Dr. Fletcher was made chairman of the arrangement committee and Dr. Paquin secretary. The following were appointed members of the local committee now working for the success of the meeting: Finance, Drs. Baird, Rouroughs and Battle; reception, Drs. Reynolds, Pearson, Jordan and Paquin; entertainment, Drs. Minor, Peavy and VanBergen; registration, Drs. McDrayer, D. E. Sevier and Whittington; credentials, Drs. Meriwether, Glenn and Ambler; exhibits, Drs. Fletcher and Morris.

At a meeting last evening the committee on arrangement merged the committees on reception and entertainment into one and appointed a special committee to prepare a program of entertainment. It was decided practically to have smokers, a banquet and a ball, besides a drive to the hills, a picnic and a railroad excursion to neighboring points of interest.

VISITORS CONTINUE TO GO TO MONTREAT

MR. VAN HORN'S REPORT OF THE WORK'S PROGRESS.

Secretary O. B. Van Horn of the Y. M. C. A. returned yesterday from Montreat, where he went to rest for a week. While there he was asked to speak, which he did Wednesday evening, taking for his subject "Hindrances to Personal Work."

Montreat, Mr. Van Horn says, is filling rapidly with visitors. Nearly all the cottages are taken. Three meetings a day are now being held. Every morning Dr. Quarles of Washington and Lee university has been speaking, giving a series of talks on "Evidences of Christianity." Dr. Guarrant of Kentucky has been telling of his work among the mountaineers.

Rev. Thornwell Jacobs of Morganton will speak this evening, and will probably continue to speak daily until the arrival of Dr. A. C. Dixon, which will be next Tuesday.
