**Notice of Republican County Convention**

The Republicans of Macon County are hereby called to meet in convention in Franklin, on Monday, March 3rd, 1924, at 1 o'clock, P. M.

The business to be transacted in such convention is the selection of delegates to the State Convention, called to be held in Raleigh on Wednesday, March 19th, and delegates to the Congressional, Judicial and Senatorial Conventions yet to be called; and to select a County Chairman and Executive Committee. Each precinct in the County will hold a precinct convention on Saturday, March 1st, 1924, and select delegates to the County Convention and elect a precinct committee composed of three or more members.

Each precinct is entitled to one delegate and one alternate for every 50 votes or fraction thereof cast for the Republican nominee for Governor in 1920. This the 28th day of January, 1924.

**A Bit of History.**

Twenty-seven years ago a little group of women felt the need of closer co-operation between home and school. February 17th, they organized a Mothers' Circle, which has grown into the great and influential National Congress of Mothers' and Parent-Teacher Associations.

Ten years ago, after a most severe epidemic of measles and whooping cough combined, a little band of mothers realized the same great need in Franklin and with the help and advice of two or three teachers, organized a Mothers' Club. The State of North Carolina had not, at that time, affiliated with the national organization, so this club joined the national organization, sent dues to Washington, D. C., and received membership cards which entitled holders to membership in any state. Since North Carolina has been organized, the club sends dues to the State Treasurer. One or two years the need seemed so great at home that the club voted not to send dues, but it was soon realized that this was not wise. The club needed the support the larger organization could give, needed to be a part of a great whole working together for one great purpose, child welfare.

Often the work seemed almost useless and the workers grew discouraged, but they would rally their forces and go at it again and the club is not ashamed of what has been accomplished in the past ten years. Greater things are yet in store for us if we only hold together and work together for this our great common cause. We need the support and encouragement of every man, woman and child in this community. Are you going to give it?
