Haywood County To Abolish Chain Gang

County Commissioners Decide to Quit System, Which Has Proved Too Expensive.

The county chain gang has proved too expensive and so the county commissioners have sold their twenty horses and mules and other equipment to the Wilson Construction Company, who are working on the road from Lake Junaluska to Crabtree, which is to be a concrete proposition. The thirteen men now on the gang are, since April 1st, boarders of Sheriff John F. Cabe at the county jail, where they sleep at night. They will be worked on Waynesville township roads, so they can sleep

Feeding twenty horses and mules and paying several guards was costtug an immense sum for the amount work a small gang could do, so we feel sure the commissioners have auted wisely.

At the July term and future terms of court prisoners sentenced to road work will be farmed out to Buncombe or some other county which may find it prontable.-Waynesville Mountaineer.
