When 210 farmers co-operated to sel a carlot of poultry at Washington life. in Beaufort County, an error of only ten cents was made in the entire transaction, reports the extension agent in that county.

Watch out for lice and mites with the coming of hot weather. No flock of poultry will pay profits and feed these vermin at the same time, say poultry extension specialists for the State College of Agriculture.

Feeding the pigs liberally this summer will make them less costly this fall and it might cause them to be in condition to sell on the high market in September, suggests W. W. Shay, swine extension specialist for the State College.

Many other counties now want to begin the co-operative carlot shipment of poultry. The success attending the efforts of County Agent John V. Arrendale in Macon County is attracting attention in the other mountain counties.

North Carolina set the pace in shipping strawberries during the first weeks of May. Wet weather during the latter part of the period caused a decline in prices but on the whole the prices were fair, reports the State Division of Markets.

If you can't get ice this summer, build a home-made iceless refrigerator. They are cheap and serviceable and will keep food cool during the hottest weather. Write Mrs. Jane S McKimmon, State Home Demonstration Agent, at Raleigh, for details.

Those who labor indoors, especially busy mothers, need to develop a healthy outdoor hobby. The vegetable or flower garden, poultry yard or children's play ground offer such an opportunity and the body will be quick to respond, say home demonstration workers of the State College of Agriculture.
