Notice to Fruit and Vegetable Shippers

The Tallulah Falls Railway Company has a published tariff permitting the stopping of car of vegetables or fruits and apples at as many stations as necessary on T. F. Ry. for completion of the carload and come within the required carload minimum.

The entire contents of the car must be consigned to one consignee at one destination.

A charge of \$5.00 will be made for each stop when the car is taken out of the train and \$2.00 per car for each stop when the loading is done while the train is standing at the station and the car is not cut out of train but merely opened at the station to load additional shipments.

After the loading is completed the consignment will be charged for on basis of the highest carload rate and minimum weight applicable on any article contained in the car from the initial point of shipment to final destination, plus the stoppage charge.

BUTTER.

On last Thursday morning, the five grocery stores in Franklin were over stocked with butter. None wanted to buy. For the last they bought they paid 30c per pound.

It has been suggested that it would be better for the farmers if most of the cream could be sold at the cream station instead of being churned. It can be hand skimmed. A cream separator is not necessary. The cream station is paying 35c per pound for butter fat this week.

He was laid to rest in the Tellico cemetery, September 1st, under a mound of beautiful flowers, awaiting the Judgment Day.

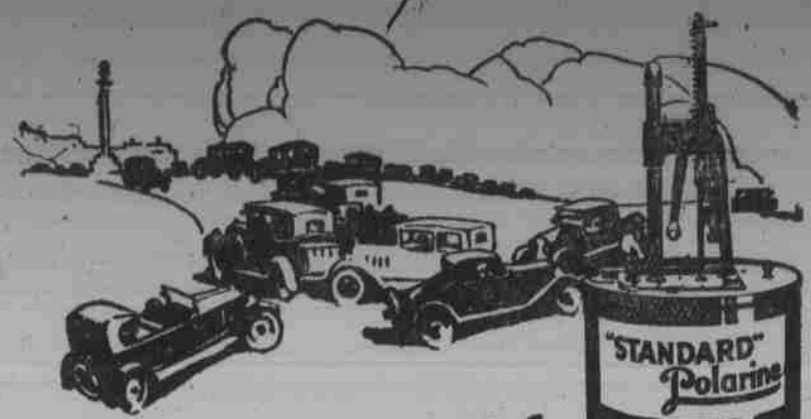
Oh, how we will miss him in our Sunday School. He was a deacon at the Tellico Baptist Church for several years, and has always been a faithful member.
