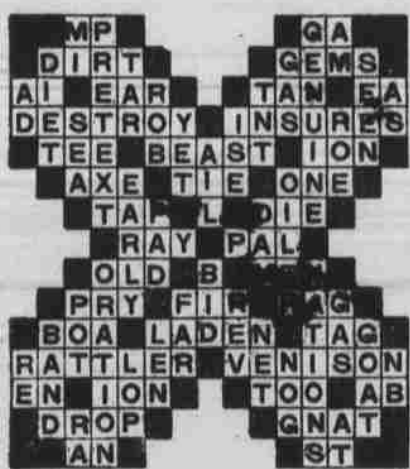

Slagle as temporary directors. The directors were instructed to secure a charter, collect the balance of stock and purchase and install the necessary equipment in a building that they may rent. The next meeting is to be held at 1:00 P. M. on Wednesday, May 13th for the purpose of electing a permanent board of directors, adopting by-laws, and transacting other necessary business.
