Sanatorium, April 20.-The new State Prison Sanatorium, the first of its kind in the United States, opened April 18 with eleven tuberculous prisoners. Three of the prisoners are white 8 colored. It is a division of the North Carolina Sanatorium under the supervision of the Sanatorium management. The prisonerpatients will be kept under guard, but otherwise they will receive the same care and treatment that the other tuberculous persons at the State Sanatorium do. The building is a modern freproof construction, combining a prison's barred windows with the main features of a sana-


