District No. 1 of the Federation of Women's clubs met at Waynesville recently with four delegates from Franklin attending. The Federation has 30,000 members and District No. 1, including all the state west of Asheville, will hold its next annual meeting in Franklin next fall. Mr. Arthur Sanders left Tuesday for Miami, Fla., taking along a supply of handbills gotten out by the Blue Ridge Real Estate and Development company advertising Franklin and Macon county. Mr. Sanders will tack up these posters between Franklin and Miami and distribute them at other points in Georgia and Florida.

The town board met at a call meeting Monday night and finished up the necessary legal matters in connection with the construction of the power line to Cowee. The rights of way for the line cost \$266.00 and Mr. Charles Oliver was employed to clear the right of way. The Mica Products company's bond of \$5,000 was accepted. This bond guarantees the town against loss in the event that the mine ceases to operate.

Mr. D. W. Rounds, representing James Leffell & Company, who sold the wheels at the power plant to the town, was here latter part of last week and first of this week inspecting the wheels as set by the Electrical Constructors Company. Mr. Round stated that the wheels were properly set and that no changes were necessary.

It is understood that Mr. Charlie Shields is trying to stop the General Mica & Clay Company from operating at the Iotla bridge, claiming that the sand bar formed near the plant will likely injure his land on the opposite side of the river. The General Mica & Clay Company spends over \$30,000 per year, in Macon county and the friends of both parties hope that the matter in dispute may be adjusted.

TURKEY AND POULTRY SALE

The turkey and poultry sale last Wednesday was the biggest ever held in Franklin. One car could not hold all the turkeys and poultry brought to town, consequently many farmers had to take their fowls back home to be held for another sale on December 9th or near that date.

Since the farmers did not notify Mr. Arrendale of the number of turkeys they would have for sale, the county agent provided only one car therefore Mr. Arrendale cannot be blamed for the inconveniences caused to some.

The car left Thursday morning carrying 7792 pounds of turkeys, 4151 pounds of hens, 2486 pounds of fryers and some roosters, ducks and guineas. Total weight was 14,881 pounds and amount received at Franklin \$3155.84. A late telegram from the buyer asked that the car be crowded. Hence more turkeys and poultry were loaded at Otto and Dillard Thursday morning.

Road Work in Rabun

The state highway board in session at East Point Thursday, awarded a number of important road and bridge contracts.

Three grading contracts in Rabun county were awarded, covering approximately 15 miles, involving about \$175,000 and completing the state aid mileage allotment in that county. Contracts are for grading of stretches on the Tallulah Falls-North Carolina line oad and were let to M. R. Woodall of Atlanta and Davis & Scroggins of Commerce.—Atlanta Constitution, November 13.
