**Mica Products Co. To Install New Machinery**

The Mica Products Company, operating the old Rickman mine at the head of Cowee, eleven miles from Franklin, is now mining seven tons of mica per day. Additional machinery will be installed in a few days which will increase the output to ten tons per day. Mr. H. G. Webber, superintendent of the mine states that his company is now paying the town of Franklin approximately \$3,600 per year for electric current. When the additional machinery is installed the amount paid the town will amount to more than \$4,000 per year.

The Mica Products has a fine plant which includes buildings for the machinery, a handsome bungalow for the superintendent and several other buildings. Mr. Webber states that the supply of mica is apparently inexhaustible, there being enough blocked out now to last for eight or ten years at the present rate of mining. Mr. Webber has fourteen men on his payroll and is shipping a carload of mica per week to the company's grinding plant at East Point, Georgia.

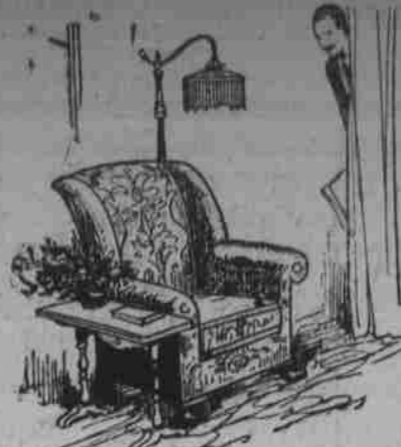
**DISTINGUISHED VISITOR HERE**

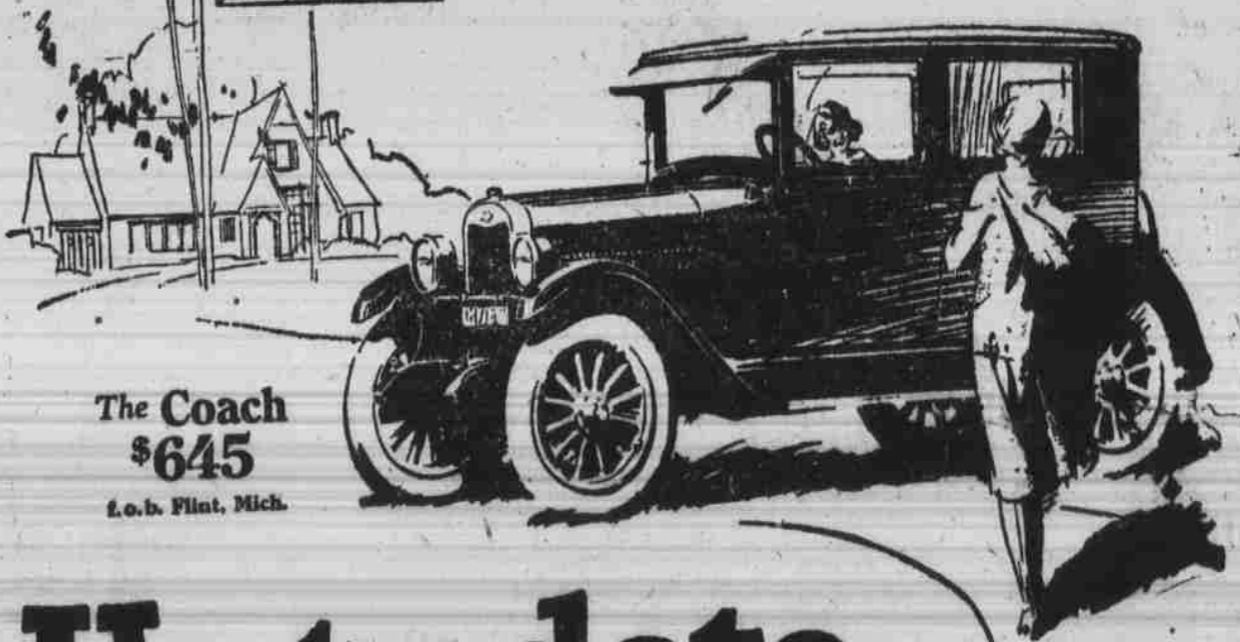
