

REPUBLICANS WIN TWO COUNTY OFFICES

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In the State election, the Democrats won by a vote approximating 100,000. They elected every State officer, including a Chief Justice of the Supreme court, three associate justices, a corporation commissioner, one U. S. senator, 10 congressmen, and 11 Superior court judges.

In the tenth district, Congressman Zebulon Weaver was re-elected over Kenneth Smathers by a majority that Mr. Weaver estimated would run to 7,500.

Although comparatively few voted upon them, some counties even reported that they never received any ballots on the questions at issue, the constitutional amendment and the referendum appeared to have carried easily.

The amendment would give the State Board of Elections authority to canvass the returns for State officers, rather than the legislature. The ob-

ject of this amendment, it was explained by its proponents, was to make it possible for the Governor and other State officers to take office on January 1, rather than wait until after the legislature convened and canvassed the vote.

The referendum proposed a bond issue of \$2,000,000 to be loaned to North Carolina veterans of the World War for the purpose of building or buying homes.

Nationally, the election resulted in the loss by the Republicans of seven seats in the United States senate. On paper, the Republicans will have exactly half the senators in the next senate, but 8 of the 48 are "insurgents" on whom the party can not in every case depend, judging by past experience. Also, the possibility of the senate's refusing to seat Vare, of Pennsylvania, and Smith, of Illinois, looms.

The outstanding victories for the Democrats were in New York and Massachusetts. In the

former, Governor Alfred E. Smith was re-elected for the fourth time, and Senator James W. Wadsworth, Jr., was defeated by Robert F. Wagner, Democrat. In the latter, Senator William I. Butler, chairman of the Republican National Committee, and the only candidate who was definitely endorsed by President Coolidge, was defeated by David I. Walsh.

In the House, the Republicans will continue in the majority.

In Western North Carolina there were many upsets. Republican Cherokee named Democrats as sheriff and clerk of the Superior court; Democratic Jackson elected a full Republican county ticket, although giving Democratic State candidates a majority; the roll of county offices in Republican Swain will contain the names of six Democrats after January 1; and Democratic Macon elected a representative and one county commissioner from the Republican ranks.

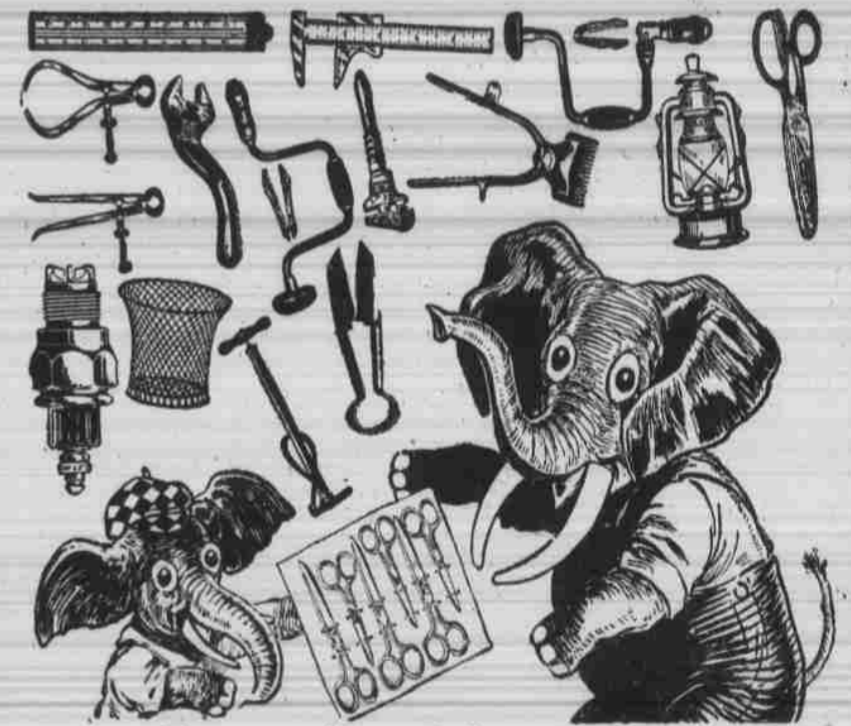
