## Chamber Moves Office

## NEW TOWN BOARD NOW AT THE HELM

### Chief of Police Ordered to Remain in Town—Will Later Wear Uniform—Sisk Town Attorney—Angel Health Officer.

Passing an order instructing Chief of Police R. M. Coffey to confine his activities to the area within the city limits was the outstanding action of Franklin's new Board of Aldermen when it met for the first time last Thursday evening.

Mr. Coffey, acting as a deputy sheriff, has been a leader in the capture of liquor cars outside the town limits. The action of the board, though it was taken in executive session, was understood to have been based upon the belief that there is a demand for the officer paid by the town to confine his work to the town itself.

In recent months, Mr. Coffey has led a large number of raids, with numbers of liquor cars captured. He was under instructions from the former board to answer the call of the sheriff's office to act as deputy, but not to leave the town unprotected.

The board also ordered Mr. Coffey to wear uniform, and voted an appropriation to purchase two uniforms for him.

For the ensuing two years, Mayor George B. Patton appointed Aldermen M. L. Dowdle, S. R. Joines, and W. N. Sloan as a street committee, while the water and light committee is composed of Aldermen H. W. Cabe, T. W. Angel, Sr., and John E. Rickman.

Mr. Rickman was chosen mayor pro-tem.

The only changes in town employes were election of R. D. Sisk, retiring mayor, as town attorney, and election of Dr. F. Angel as city health officer. Mr. Sisk succeeds George B. Patton, who was elected mayor last week, as town attorney. Dr. Angel succeeds Dr. T. H. Horsley as health officer.

No changes were made in the salaries of the various town employes, it was stated by Mayor Patton after the meeting, and no other changes in personnel were made, but in several instances employes were employed only until the next meeting of the board, when definite action as to retaining or replacing them is expected.

The entire first meeting of the board was held in executive session, employes being called in one at a time.

The only other business of the meeting, according to Mayor Patton, was routine—passing on bills, etc.
