Dear Sir: We have examined Scott's Mechanical Budgetary Control System of Accounts in use in Macon County as of February 7, 1928, and beg to render you herewith the following detail report covering the county's FINANCIAL POSITION and the POSITION of the BUDGET at the date named:

The condensed status of the various fund accounts are as follows, the detail of which will be found under Paragraph 1:

TOTAL COMBINED SURPLUS \$167,389.61 The above accounts have been credited with the 1927 taxes, and the surplus balances as shown are, of course, subject to the remainder of the fiscal year's operations.

4-CONCLUSION It is stated that all taxes shown as estimated revenue are NET after provision for nulla bona and the expense of tax collections. Provision has also been made covering Treasurers Commissions.
