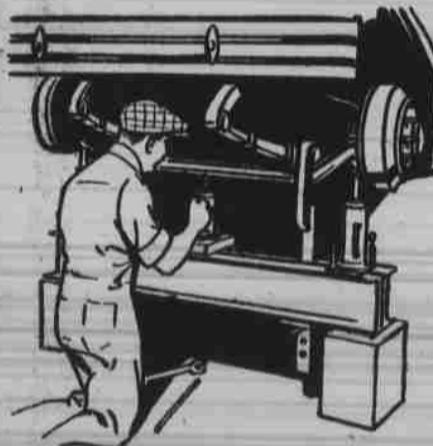

Are Our Eyes Open?

What would the people of the United States say if individuals or a political party began to agitate to do away with one of our most treasured constitutional possessions—namely, the right to the private ownership of property?

Instead of advocating such a policy in plain English, there are well-meaning people in this nation who propose plans which would accomplish practically the same result in a modified form under the guise of government ownership, public ownership or municipal ownership of various lines of business and industry.

It is a generally understood fact that our government was originally founded to relieve the people from exorbitant taxation demanded to maintain officialism and the divine right of kings. In America the new government was to exist for the people, rather than the people existing for the government. Thomas Jefferson laid down a cardinal principle when he said: "That government is best which governs least."

It makes little difference what excuses are offered for putting the government into business, the net result is that each such act destroys the right of some individual or group of individuals to own and operate private property under our fundamental laws.

What is the use of blinding ourselves to the fact that no matter how honey-coated with words and promises the proposition for public ownership may be, when the government goes into business it drives its private citizens and taxpayers out of the same line of endeavor because there can be no private competition with tax-free government undertakings.

This brings up the question of taxation. One of the arguments of proponents of public ownership of industry is that such projects could furnish service more cheaply than private enterprise because of being tax-free. But what is tax-free? Proponents of public ownership measures do not attempt to claim that taxes would be reduced by this type of ownership of industry. As a matter of fact, they would undoubtedly be increased if the records of the past can be taken as a guide for the future—profits are not essential to public operation and deficits can be charged to the taxpayer. Any taxes which private industry would pay and which public ownership would not pay,

which was not publicly owned. These are facts which cannot be escaped.

The big basic principle for all citizens to consider is whether or not they wish to change our form of government which heretofore has encouraged private initiative and enterprise and private ownership of property, for an ancient form of government which destroys rights and privileges of the individual.

Shall we go back to European practices from which we escaped some 150 years ago? Shall the government become a competitor with private citizens instead of exercising its present functions of regulation and control?

As a people, we cannot afford to be blinded to this real issue which confronts us. It is not a matter of partisan politics but it is a great question involving the personal rights and liberties of ourselves, our children and their children to come.

If the people wish to change their form of government, the majority will eventually decide, but let the decision be based on an understanding of the facts.—Industrial News Bureau.

Clinic For Cripples

Through the Rotary Orthopaedic Clinic at Sylva, which meets for the second time on Saturday, October 20th, in the Methodist church, many cripples of this section of the state who have despaired of having their deformities corrected are being provided with an opportunity to secure treatment by an orthopaedic specialist that will remove a part if not all of their physical handicaps.

The Sylva Clinic is a link in the chain of clinics established over the entire State of North Carolina by the State Department of Vocational Rehabilitation for the purpose of providing such treatment to all of the indigent cripples of the state. No one can estimate the value of this program, not only to these handicapped people themselves, but to the communities in which they reside and the commonwealth as a whole.

Orthopaedic treatment is but the first step in the program of the Rehabilitation Department. After the physical handicap has been removed as far as possible, the Department provides a course of vocational training to fit the disabled party for a vocation suited to any remaining handicap, and then aids him in securing suitable employment. Thus he is fitted for an active life of usefulness, supporting himself and dependents, and contributing to the production of his community. From a non-producer and a potential mendicant is evolved a happy, independent and useful citizen.

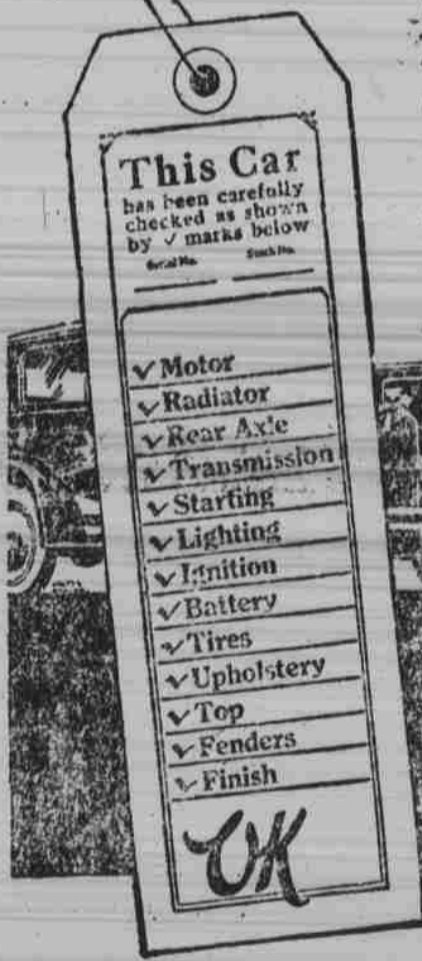
