MACON REQUIRES LICENSE TO FISH

State of North Carolina, County of Macon.

WHEREAS the fishing streams of this county are badly in need of restocking, and

WHEREAS the fish in said streams, should be given adequate protection so that the supply of fish may be further increased and conserved, and

WHEREAS the Board of County Commissioners is of the opinion that it will be advisable to provide a resident county license in order to supplement funds to be allotted to our county from other sources for the protection and propagation of fish:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of Macon county, that pursuant to the terms of H. B. 238, S. B. 1232, Section 4, of said law, entitled "An act for the Propagation and Protection of Game Fish in North Carolina and Providing Revenue Therefor," enacted by the General Assembly of North Carolina, at its session of 1929, that an annual resident county license of \$1.10 or in lieu of such license a daily fishing permit to cost 50c, is hereby required of all male persons above the age of sixteen who wish by any and all methods of hook and line and rod and reel fishing in Macon county.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Department of Conservation and Development, Raleigh, N. C., and that a copy be spread upon the minutes of this Board.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Anderson have returned from an Easter holiday trip to Atlanta.

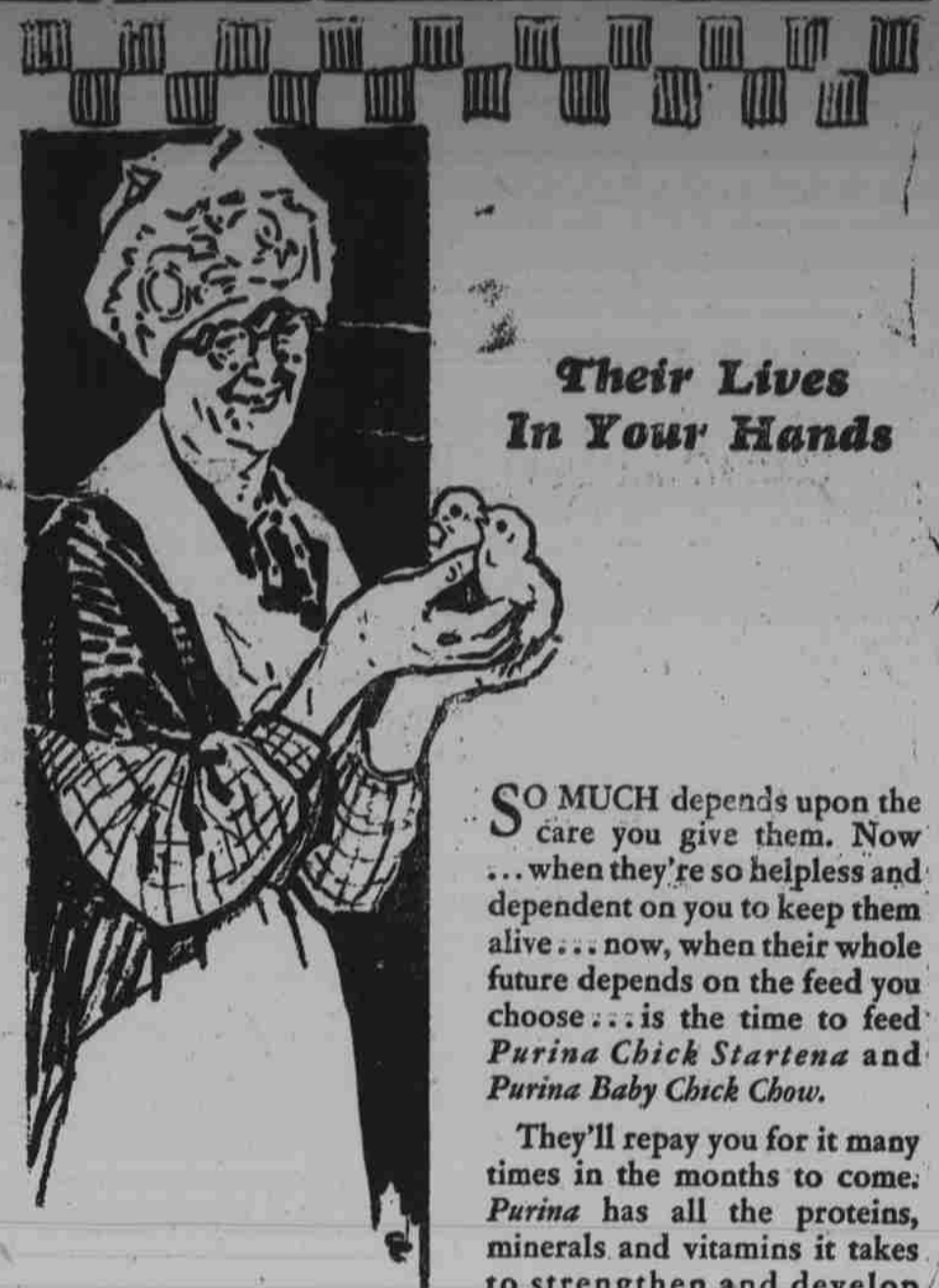
Pine Tree Inn Improvements
