The forestry extension meeting mentioned in last week's Press will be held on August 9 at 10 A. M. at Maxwell School. The meeting will be conducted by County Agent Fred Sloan and will have W. R. Mattoon and R. W. Graeber, extension foresters for the federal government and North Carolina, respectively, in attendance. The meeting will be in the open air and a large attendance is expected.

Unless an afternoon meeting is requested by some other community the balance of the day will be taken up by the foresters going over the county. They expect to spend several weeks studying farm forestry conditions in North Carolina.
