Dr. A. J. Barton of Atlanta will preach on August 11th. He is one of the leaders of the Southern Baptist Convention. Let us fill the house to hear him.

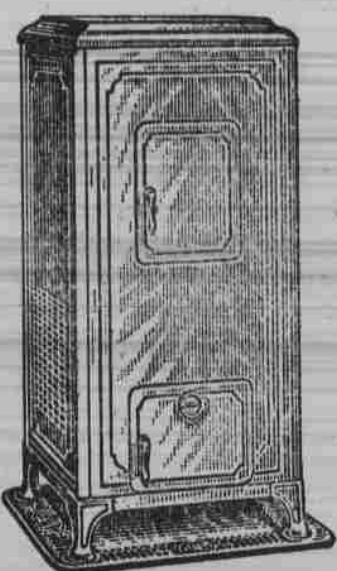
