County Appropriations Average 1-4 Cent Per Acre Of Forest Land

The commissioners of Cherokee county, at their June meeting, signed a co-operative agreement with the State Forest service for forest fire protection. Clay county signed a similar agreement in May, so there are now only two non-cooperating counties in the thirteen that comprise the Western District. These two are Transylvania and Graham.

The fire season just passed was the worst experienced since the spring of 1926. It was characterized by greatly sub-normal rainfall and by almost conmake the control of a forest fire exof a ridge or mountain.

Forest fire control work in this State is financed by a 50-50 appropriation by the State and the individual counties. In other words, the State matches any appropriation a county sees fit to make, the work depending entirely upon the voluntary co-operation of the several counties. Good Record


In view of the above facts the record of the warden organization in District One this spring is considerably better than is at first apparent. We had about 550 fires, which burned over about two and one-half per cent of the forest land under protection. It is the objective of the State Forest service to keep the burned area down to one-tenth of one per cent.
