very cold. Serve in sherbet glasses lined with finely shredded lettuce and topped with stiff mayonnaise and sliced pimento-stuffed olives.

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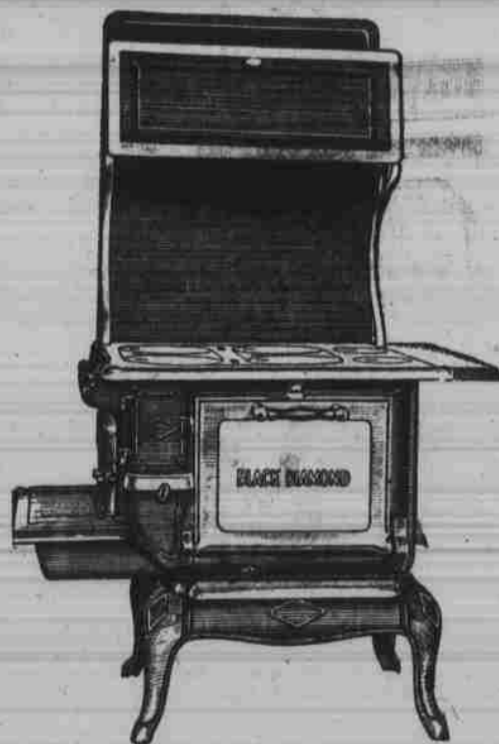
