

APPLE COMBINATIONS

For novelties, apples may be combined with other fruits into a sauce, which goes well with meats. Try combining apples with quinces. Cook them together, one fourth as much quince as apple. Apples and pineapple combine well into a sauce. Add minced pineapple to the apple sauce. Add one cup of cranberries to one of apples and make a sauce. It will be a pretty pink. To serve with hot pork roast, try apples and onions, combining equal quantities of unsweetened apple sauce and cooked onions. This should be served hot.

The first few weeks in the feed lot is a critical time for feeder steers. Start with limited quantities of concentrated feeds and increase them

very gradually during the first 30 days. Roughages of good quality may be fed in any quantity without harm. However, they add bulk to the ration and the more roughage the steers eat the smaller will be the daily gains, and the longer the fattening period.

A CHILD'S COAT

Children's outdoor garments should be soft and warm and light in weight and large enough to permit freedom of movements. Rough surfaced materials, loosely woven, are warmer than fine, smooth material of tighter weave. Plain material may be used for the outside, if the lining is light and wooly. Pongee, or any light material, is good for summer coats.

Cherokee Indians To Celebrate Indian Summer

Asheville, Sept. 22.—Following a traditional custom centuries-old the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians living peacefully on their reservation in the foothills of the Great Smoky mountains near Asheville will celebrate with their native dances and sports the harvest season of 1930. The events which will attract a great throng of spectators this year will be held at Cherokee, N. C., October 7 to 10.

To the accompaniment of drums and rattles and primitive musical instruments, the Big Cove Indians, a division of the Eastern Band will perform the annual Green Corn Dances which have been celebrated for centuries by the Cherokees as thanks giving dances in honor of the ripening maize. Men and women will take part in the dances in groups of a score or more in each dance, the performers wearing native costumes.

Features of the Cherokee Fair will also be the Indian ball games played with ball sticks like small tennis rackets and according to rules similar to the modern game of lacrosse. This game played by the Cherokees is in fact a preservation of the original form of lacrosse.

Naked with the exception of trunks, feathers and painted totem the players during the annual fair will enter into the spirit of the game with the keen rivalry which makes the sport a far more exciting event than football. Thousands of friends and supporters of the teams cheering on the sidelines will add to the color and pageantry of the sport.

The ball games, the archery contests, the blowgun events, the dances and the exhibition of beadwork, agricultural products, basketry and other handwork of native Indian craftsmen will make the Indian fair this fall a colorful celebration.

MARKETING

When buying grapes, select large, compact bunches, with large individual berries. When the grapes fall off and the bunches are loose and straggly, something is wrong. The bunches should not show many decayed, cracked, shrivelled nor hard, green berries. The bunch as a whole should be good, not merely the individual berries.

The best mangoes have a firm, smooth, bright green outer shell. Dull yellowish, rough wrinkled or flabby shells are not so good. A soft, watery decay should be avoided.

Cabbage should be crisp and green, the head solid and well formed and the outer leaves trimmed off. Cauliflower should have an outer green jacket, but the flower should be white
