Waynesville Council

The Waynesville council No. 1373 which was organized August 10, 1911, has 277 members with more than a dozen applicants ready for their degree work.

With in the past year the Waynesville council has made another record in memberships. It is now the largest in point of membership out of more than 500 councils with a total membership of 50,000 in North Carolina.

The secret of the Waynesville council growth is this: In 1929 they divided the lodge into two teams. The teams were to work for new members for a year's period; at the end of the year the losing team had to give the winning team a banquet. This drive has been in force for three years and the results are worth while.

I am going to offer a suggestion for each and every lodge in the county. Take the roll book, the first of the year, and divide the lodge's membership into two teams—take the first name on the roll book for team No. one and the second name for team No. two and so on down through the membership. By doing this there will be no comeback as having the best worker on one team. Then let each team elect a captain—and the fight is on.

If we will all do our part at the end of 1932 we should have at least 200 new members within the county with at least \$100,000 more insurance in force within the county.

As the councils organize and begin work I would like to have each team elect its captain's name. And from month to month we will have printed the results in this "corral."

Shouldn't the wheels—let's go, and be sure of a real good feed at the last of 1932.

How would it sound to let the council making the greatest gain according to membership, have a prize?
