# Citizens Of Jackson Lt. Bridges Is War Prisoner **Making Good Use Of** In Germany **Library Facilities**

#### **During March**, 1.348 Books Were Borrowed From Bookmobile Service Unit.

The Jackson County Library is an important educational and cultural asset to Sylva and Jackson county. It was established in 1937 through the efforts of the Sylva Chamber of Commerce and a few interested citizens. Financed in the beginning by the W.P.A., it has grown from a few hundred books to a really splendid collection of approximately four thousand volumes, with a monthly circulation of 1250 books amongst something like 675 borrowers.

Since the withdrawal of W.P.A. support the library has been financed by funds from the State Library Commission and by contributions from the county, the town of Sylva and from local clubs.

The library is located in the Sherrill Building on the Main St., in Sylva, and is open every afternoon except Saturday, between the hours of one and five-thirty. In order to have library service made available to its employees and their families in these counties the Tennessee Valley Authority bears the full expense of operating the bookmobile, including the salary of Miss Nisler, bookmobile librarian. The collection of books in this tri-county service numbers 4360, a contribution, also of TVA. It will be interesting and perhaps surprising to many to know that during the month of March, 1348 books were borrowed from the bookmobile by 306 Jackson readers. The bookmobile changes the collection of books at the various stations once every four weeks. Notices are sent to the Station Custodians asking them to have ready the list of books the people in their community would like to have left at the station. Just as the home base was sighted, the third motor cut out, leaving Captain Brown and the nine other members of the crew in what appeared a helpless predicament.

The best pilot Brown could do was to set the bomber down in a plowed field, after crossing an irrigation ditch.




