

Captain Brown's Crippled Bomber



This photograph shows the tail of the four-motored bomber, piloted by Captain Malcolm Brown, formerly of Sylva, which he landed safely in this plowed field, after the engines went dead on a return bombing trip over Germany. Pilot Brown had to hop-skip over the open ditch shown in the left of the picture. The plane and all ten members of the crew landed without injuries, due to the skillful piloting of Captain Brown.
