A school for the tax listers has been conducted by the County Tax Supervisor T. Walter Ashe, at which time instructions were given as to tax listing, and supplies and listing material was distributed to the fifteen list takers.

The listers will again be required to take a farm census this year. All farm owners, tenants and others are asked to have this informatoin available when listing their taxes.

Returning service men, Mr. Lambert said, can obtain a record of wages reported for them by all employers since December 31, 1936 by using a post card form which can be obtained, upon request from the office in Asheville. Ask for Form OAR-7004. If wages have not been reported correctly, this fact should be made known at once in order that an investigation may be started.

All workers should remember to notify the Social Security Board in Asheville when they reach age 65, Mr. Lambert said, and surviving relatives of persons who have died should notify the Asheville office to avoid loss of benefits.



### JACKSON AMONG FEW COUNTIES MAKING E BOND QUOTA

Township Totals And Bicycle Winners To Be Announced Soon

Jackson county goes over the top in the 8th and final War Loan Drive. These were the words given out by Chairman R. L. Ariail Monday asthe end of the final Victory Loan drive came to a close. Mr. Ariail stated that the county with a quota of \$175,-000 doubled that amount and went on to a grand total of \$390,000, or \$40,000 more than double the quota. The county's overall quota was divided into two types of bonds, with the larger amount of \$108,000 being the "E" bond sold to individual buyers and the other type known as the Commercial bond amounted to \$67,000.

Mr. Ariail further commented: 'It appeared throughout most of the drive that we would not make the "E" bond quota, but during the last few days of the drive a determined and concerted effort was made, thus putting Jackson county over the top in this, the last and final bond drive.

The 8th War Loan drive, better known as the Victory Loan, which ended Monday, Decorates 31.7 Treasury Department has announced that the people will not be called on again to buy bonds during a War bond drive. Series E bonds will continue to be offered to people seeking investment for their money and they can be bought right along as usual from banks and post offices. Commer-President and Ira Armfield of the cial type bonds may be offered from time to time to banks and other financial institutions but there will not be any more War Loan drives.

### THREE BICYCLES OFFERED

During the drive just closed three bicycles were offered as prizes to the pupils in the schools of Jackson county. The prizes are to be given to the three pupils selling the largest amount of Series E bonds during the drive. A number of students entered the contest but it is not yet known who won the prizes. Mr. A. C. Moses, superinendent of education for Jackson county, will announce the winners in the near fuutre. It may be some time before the bicycles can be delivered as they have not been ordered because it was not known whether they would be for boys or girls. However, I hope the delay will not be very long.

### EXPRESSES APPRECIATION

It has been my responsibility to act as Chairman of the War Finance Committee in the county for all of the eight War Loan drives put on during the war. Now that the War Loan drives are over and the War Finance Office will be closed I wish to take this opportunity to thank the people of Jackson county, along with my co-workers, City and Township Chairmen and ail others who had any part in helping to make all eight drives a success in Jackson county.
