

KEEP OUR AMERICA GREEN



Keeping America green is an industrial and civic objective that is sweeping through the forest states of the nation.

Thirteen states are now enlisted in a "keep green" movement, designed to keep fire out of the woods and off the ranges. Ten of these states joined the program during 1945 and eight more are expected to initiate similar plans early

Starting in Washington state a few years ago under the slogan "Keep Washington Green", the program is based upon recognition that fire is forest enemy No. 1, and that the

chief cause of forest fires is man's carelessness. A quarter of them are started by careless cigarette amokers alone.

Today, Oregon, Montana, Minnesota, Virginia, North Carolina, Mississippi, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Rhode Island have similar programs in effect, enlisting the joint efforts of state forestry departments, industry, farmers, labor, women's clubs and other civis groups who understand the feet that efforts and other civic groups who understand the fact that efforts of owners of forest lands to produce trees for future supplies can be nullified by fire.
