HUGH MONTEITH IS SCOUT COURT OF HONOR SPEAKER

Duties Of Adults To Youth Stressed At Hendersonville

Hugh Monteith, Sylva attorney and a member of the Daniel Boone Council of Boy Scouts of America, was the speaker at the April Court of Honor of Land-o'-Sky district, held in Hendersonville last week.

Speaking on "Delinquency," Mr. Monteith called attention to the gravity of the present situation in the United States, but added that in spite of possible views to the contrary, there is no such thing as boy and girl delinquency, and that the real blame rests on the shoulders of the adults.

"Adults -who are of the view that they do not have the responsibility of the youth of the land are not to be considered worthwhile citizens of their respective com-

munities," he said, and then added: "If the city, state or nation would spend as much money on the welfare of juveniles as they do on the penal program for wayward youth, there would be no need of a juve-

nile delinquency setup." The speaker bemoaned the lethargic view of many adults toward the welfare of youth, but added a bit of sunlight to the dark picture when he said:

"In my years of practicing law in many courts of this state, I am happy to report that on no occasion have I seen a Boy Scout on trial for any crime."
