Later the grandfather of one of the present managers bought out the other

The inn has been operated this summer by M. C. (Mike) Jennings of Pittsburgh and William Hart of Columbus, Ga. Scheduled to close September 15, it will be taken over by Mr. Wofford and the improvements planned will be made as rapidly as building conditions and material shortages permit.

The Boyer Realty company of Asheville represented the Jennings estate and Frank Cook of Highlands represented Mr. Wofford. The amount involved in the deal was not disclosed.


