TO BRYSON CITY AND Sylva, Other Towns Proposed Sylva Is Listed For \$95,000 Building, Say

Reports From Capital

The Post Office Department has proposed the construction of new post office buildings in several Western North Carolina towns, including Sylva and Bryson City, according to an announcement from Washington.

The Sylva office is named among 107 for the entire state which is proposed to spend 15 million dollars to construct new Federal buildings. The Sylva building calls for an expenditure of \$95,000.00 and the Bryson City building \$85,000.

Both the Federal Works agency and the Congress must approve such projects. To be eligible for a new post office, an addition or alteration, a community must show gross postal receipts of \$10,000 or more annually. Many post offices in the state do that much business in rented space, it was learned.

Other near-by towns for which buildings are proposed are Robbinsville, Andrews and Murphy.

It is possible that the Eightieth Congress next year will receive proposals for an even larger group of North Carolina post office buildings because the list was made on the basis of 1944 receipts.
