Governor Ellis Arnall ordered the state capitol closed Saturday in respect for the deceased and stated that the body would lie in state from 2 to 5 o'clock Sunday in the rotunda of the capitol building. All State officials attended the funeral which was held at 2 p. m. Monday at the Talmadge farms home on Sugar Creek, near Mc-Rae, Ga.

The death of Talmadge has caused a battle to loom for his successor. Governor Arnall will hold office until a successor is named.
