SOUTHERN PLACES HUGE ORDER FOR NEW EQUIPMENT

Ernest E. Norris, president of the Southern Railway System, announced today that the railway has placed orders for new freight cars and Diesel motive power to cost a total of \$16,500,000. The new rolling stock comprises 3,000 box cars to be built by Pullman-Standard Car Manufacturing Company at Bessemer, Ala., and 1,000 hopper cars to be built by American Car & Foundry Company at St. Louis, Mo. Three 6000-h.p. Diesel-electric road freight locomotives have been ordered from Electro-Motive Division of General Motors Corporation at LaGrange, Ill.

The placing of the orders, Mr. Norris, said, "is another indication that we are progressing our modernization and improvement programs as rapidly as financial and other conditions permit, in order to keep step with the South's tremendous industrialization." In addition to the present purchases, the Southern has on order 68 road freight Diesel units of 1500 h.p., fifteen 1000-h.p. and four 2000-h.p. Diesel switchers, and six switchers of 600 to 660-h.p. Other freight cars on order include 1000 automobile box cars, 600 gondolas, 500 box cars, and 250 ballast cars. Plans to re-equip four of its passenger trains with the most modern equipment were set in motion last summer when the Southern placed orders for 101 new, light-weight streamlined passenger cars. In addition orders for 39 more cars have been placed by other railroads over which the equipment will be operated.
