

FLOATING DRY DOCK BEING BUILT ON FONTANA LAKE

Zenas Hyatt, of Baysville, is in charge of building a floating dry dock to be placed at Sugar Branch on Fontana Lake.

Mr. Hyatt expects that work on the first section is completed and will be placed on the lake by April 20. This will accommodate 12 boats. Three other units will be placed on the lake in May. The dock is being built by TVA.

The dock will be 11 feet high and 34 feet wide. It is being built of 2 x 4's and 3 x 3's on beams. When completed the dock will have 12 lockers and will accommodate 24 to 30 boats.

District Sanitarian Announces Grades Of Cafes, Dairies, Etc.

Mr. Charlie Thomas, district sanitarian, has announced grade ratings for the cafes, hotels, food markets, and dairies of Jackson county as follows: Grade A—Vets Cafe, Sylva; Grade B—Bus Station, Coffee Shop, Park Lunch Room, Sports Center, Sylva; Backs Cafe, Sylva; College S. S. Shop, Cullowhee; Grade C—Bridle Cafe, Sylva; C. B. Cafe, Sylva.

To become a grade A place must have a rating of 90 to 100; grade B from 80 to 89; and grade C from 70 to 79.

The county has six grade A dairies as follows: McKee Training school, 99.5; Q. I. school, 97.5; Savannah school, 96.0; Webster school, 94.5; Sylva school, 91.5. Dairies in grade B are: Dairies not serving milk and using paper on single service are not graded but are checked for compliance with the milk laws and regulations. Sylva Pharmacy and Hooper's Drug store are complying.

The county has six grade A pharmacies as follows: Q. E. Hollister, Whittier; Homer Taylor, Whittier; Barber-Burgmaster, Whittier; Boyd Brown, Dillsboro; Stearns, Whittier; and Western Carolina Teacher, Cullowhee.

The county has six grade B pharmacies as follows: G. L. A. S. Pharmacy, Sylva; G. B. B. Sylva Supply, Sylva; Peoples Federation, Sylva; Albee, Sylva; Battle's Market, Cullowhee; Grade C—Duke Market, Sylva.
