

In brief, the group told the president the public is not receiving sufficient national income to buy the goods which farms and factories are turning out. Last Janat \$7 billion to \$8 billion.

This means, if correct, that national purchasing power may fall short by some \$12 billion during 1947 in taking goods and services off the market at present prices. If these goods aren't sold, they will be left in shop windows; if services aren't used, it will mean unemployment.
