It shall study the need for additional entrances to the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, together with the need for additional highway approaches and connections, and its findings in this connection shall be filed as recommendations with the National Park Service of the Federal Government, and the North Carolina State Highway and Public Works Commission.

The Commission shall make a biennial report to the governor covering its work up to January 1 preceding each session of the General Assembly.

The members of the commission shall receive their necessary traveling expenses incurred while attending meetings of the commission and also such additional traveling expenses in connection with the business of the commission.

Astronomers Kept Busy Last Year By Important Events In The Heavens

Climaxing a year marked by four partial eclipses of the sun and two total eclipses of the moon, the largest sunspot group ever observed appeared in 1946, according to the Encyclopaedia Britannica 1947 Book of the Year.

Newton Lacy Pierce, associate professor of astronomy at Princeton University and author of the article in the Britannica Book of the Year, reported that one of the sunspots had an area of 4,440,000,000 square miles, which is more than twenty-two and one half times the surface area of the earth. This largest sunspot ever noted was one of a group that appeared in January.

The leading sunspot in the series appeared around the east limb of the sun on the morning of January 29. The group was so large however, that two days were required for the sun's rotation to bring the entire group into view. The area of the entire sunspot group was 6,300,000,000 square miles.

Intense flares were observed on February 6, and about 16 hours later, a magnetic storm arose. By February 8, the storm was so great that it caused interference in short wave communications to South America and Europe, the Britannica Book of the Year reported.

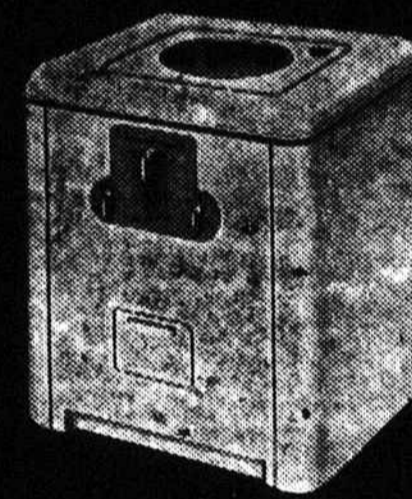
