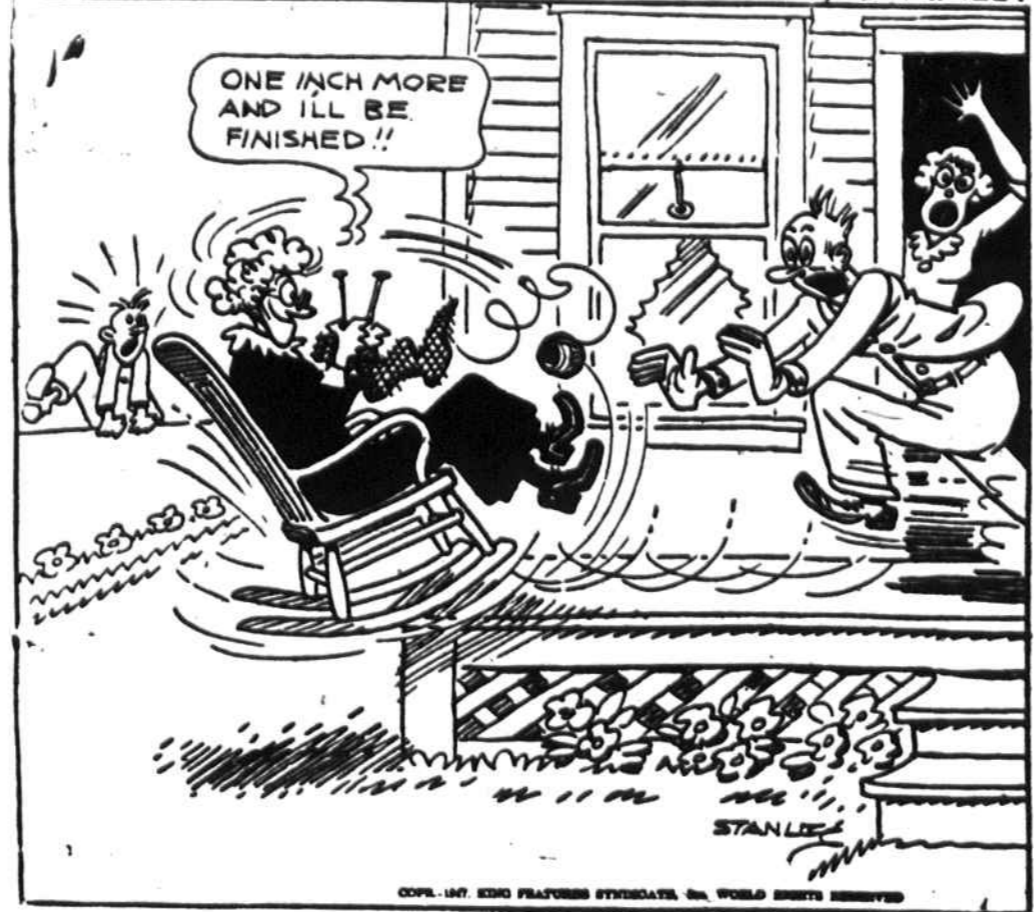
Approximately 225 Stanly County farmers recently made a field trip to Cokers Seed Farm to study a small grain breeding program being carried on there.

INSTITUTE TESTS FOR VETS MOVED TO WESTERN CAROLINA

CULLOWHEE — The United States Armed Forces Institute tests, which were formally given in Asheville every Saturday, will be given at Western Carolina Teachers College under the direction of Dr. C. D. Killian each Thursday this summer. The Guidance Clinic will offer these tests to veterans who wish to obtain high school diplomas, enter college, or to take tests on specified subjects for college credits.

To receive these credits, one must:

1. For high school diploma—take a series of five tests called General Educational Development. The time limit for each test is two hours. Dr. Killian highly recommends that these tests be taken over a period of two days, but usually, the tests are completed in about eight hours, all in the same day if desired. There is a charge of \$3.00 for the full series.

2. On the college level—take tests on English, literature, social studies, and science. Each test, if passed, gives nine hours college credits in most colleges. It is possible to receive twelve other hours by using basic training as the qualification. One full year of college may be accredited to the G.I.s who successfully complete these tests. The fee for these exams is \$1.25 for the first one and 50c for each additional one.

3. For credits in high school or college—take tests on any of the seventy-five subjects offered and pass with a good grade. These subjects include such material as American history, college algebra, elementary French, etc. In order to take these tests, the vet must have had some type of experience in the specific subject that he wishes to take. The appropriate college official or the Director of Veterans Testing Service Agency can determine the eligibility of the vet by appraising his separation record. Each college reserves the right to approve or reject any credit obtained in this manner. The first test costs \$1.23, and an addition test, 50c.
