VISITORS TO SMOKIES PARK ARE INCREASING

GATLINBURG - Visitors to Great Smoky Mountains National park are again increasing, according to John Morrell, park ranger in charge of the checking stations.


Ranger Morrell reports that April and May visitors outnumbered those for the same months last year by nearly 10 per cent.

It was last year that Smoky Mountains park, with 1,157,930 visitors, had the greatest attendance of any national park.

However, peak attendance was in 1941 when there were 1,310,101 visitors, although several other parks topped that total.

Morrell's figures showed 78,339 visitors in April and 91,239 in May, a total of 169,598, against 70,539 and 85,608 in April and May, 1946, respectively, a total of 156,146.



Here lie the remains of a driver who thought he could drink and now doing research work at Duke still drive a car. Racing down the highway at a dangerous speed, his car wandered off the edge of the pavement, dragged on the sandy shoulder, and was wrenched into a spin. Drunken drivers are potential murderers of every other motorist who comes near them on the road. They were involved in more than 5,000 fatal accidents last year. National Conservation Bureau safety specialists say even one or/two drinks slow up reactions, make judgment unsure, increase chances of accident three to four times.

When emergencies arise, you watch your budget so that you spend as little as possible. It's a good old American custom to live within income. That's a practice that makes for sturdy citizenship and for community stability.

But here we are, all of us together as a nation, very much wanting to cut our taxes but very leery about reducing budget expenditures. The national budget, you know, represents what we do with our tax money. It is fine to shout hooray when taxes are cut, but it will make more sense if we first learn to whittle down our alarming budget without frowning. A good strong lid on government But now hotel accommodations spending is the only sane route to

A Halt to Spending

The President has proposed a budget of \$37,500,000.000 which Congress is currently reviewing. Sentiment exists in Congress for a ceiling on federal spending much lower than the budget recommended by the President. Congress, as soon as possible, should place a limit of \$30,000,-000,000, above which federal spending may not go. Ultimately, a budget of \$20,000,000,000 ought to be adequate to run our federal machinery. Most citizens claim little compre-

nension of these astronomical figares. Twenty bfilion may seem more ike measurements characteristic of distances to the stars. But the figare is dollars. This proposed peacetime expenditure program of \$37,500,-100,000 is \$9,330,000,000 more than we spent for non-defense items in 1946, not counting interest on national

This astronomical budget means that almost \$300 is asked from every iving American. It is estimated that such a budget would cost the average family \$1,000 in taxes this year. Budget in hand, your pencil will show in short order that we have no petter way to get out from under our ax burdens than to limit our spending. We may cut our taxes without paying any attention to federal spending, but the outcome will be deficit spending and added debt.

You're Paying Salaries Senator Byrd says there has been very little reduction in war-expanded personnel of government. Not counting the various war agencies, Senaor Byrd points to constantly increasing personnel totals. These jumped nearly 300,000 since V-J Day. Moneywise, this tendency is graphically shown by the request of the Department of Commerce for \$261,-100,000 in 1948. This is an increase of 600% over the \$39,000,000 this department spent in 1932.

Budget reductions reviewed by Congressional committees have suggested elimination of about one-half million federal payrollers. This is all too few. To bring the number of civilian employees of the government down to the swollen figure of 1939 we must lay off 1,500,000. (We'd still have 900,000 eating from the public breadbasket.) This would be a most logical way to avoid an ansual expenditure of more than five sillion dollars. This could be money saved. It's out of your pockets and

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
