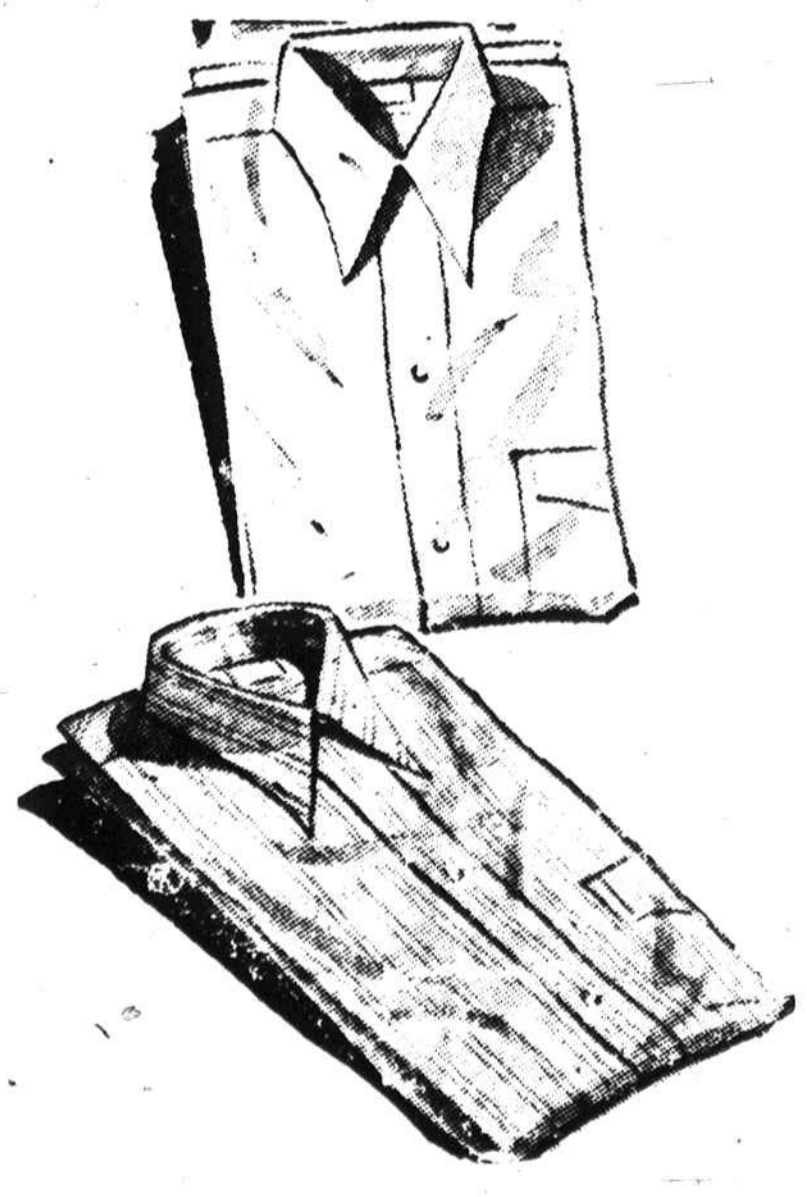
Closmans Entertain City, County Officers At Dinner Party
