## RELEASES BULLETIN

Experiments conducted by two North Carolina scientists prove In thus doing was the greatest that rotational grazing on native

Results of the experiments conducted have been released in a bulletin by the North Carolina Agriculture Experiment Station.

H. H. Biswell, of the Southeastern Forestry Experiment Station, and J. E. Foster of the Agriculture Experiment Station, conducted their experiments at the Blanckland Branch Station from 1942 to 1944. Though the tests were hampered by wild fires, enough experimental lands were unaffected to complete the experiments.

The study was designed to test two kinds of rotational grazing and compare their results to those of continuous grazing. One set of plots was grazed continuously, a second was grazed for 28 days then
