STATE COLLEGE HINTS TO FARM HOMEMAKER

An important rule for keeping home-canned food as well as jellies and jams in best condition is to put them away in a cool, dry place—and promptly. If these foods are allowed to stand around in the hot moist air of the kitchen, they lose quality and may not keep well. In heat colors fade, and flavor and texture deteriorate. Also paraffin seals on jelly glasses may loosen. In dampness tin cans and metal tops of glass jars may corrode and eventually cause leakage. The specialists add that cool, dry storage is needed also for best keeping of commercially canned goods. These products often deteriorate if left on upper shelves in the kitchen where they suffer from both heat and humidity, or if they stand in sunny grocery store windows.

ROSSER POINTS OUT REGULATIONS FOR RENEWING LICENSES

Regulation No. 3
SUBJECT: Expiration of Operators' Licenses
This regulation is promulgated by the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles of North Carolina pursuant to authority granted in Sub-section (b) of Section 20-39 of the General Statutes of North Carolina.

All operators' licenses issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles prior to July 1, 1947 shall expire as follows in accordance with G.S. 20-7 (d) and the holders thereof shall not be permitted to operate a Motor Vehicle over the Highways of North Carolina unless they secure new operators' licenses as required by law:

- (a) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "A" or the letter "B" shall expire at midnight, December 31, 1947;
- (b) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "C" or the letter "D" shall expire at midnight, June 30, 1948;
- (c) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "E", "F"

Although prices received by farmers for hogs are currently considerably above parity, the USDA announced, in accordance with the law, the schedule of prices at which hogs will be supported if prices should decline to the support level. Under the law hog prices must be supported at not less than 90 per cent of parity through the calendar year 1948, but Department officials do not anticipate that hog prices will decline to the support level during the period covered by the schedule.

- or "G" shall expire at midnight, December 31, 1948;
- (d) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "H", "I", "J" or "K" shall expire at midnight, June 30, 1949;
- (e) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "L" or the letter "M" shall expire at midnight, December 31, 1949;
- (f) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "N", "O", "P", "Q" shall expire at midnight, June 30, 1950;
- (g) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "R", "S" or "T" shall expire at midnight, December 31, 1950;
- (h) A license issued to a person whose last or surname begins with the letter "U", "V", "W", "X", "Y", or "Z" shall expire at midnight, June 30, 1951.

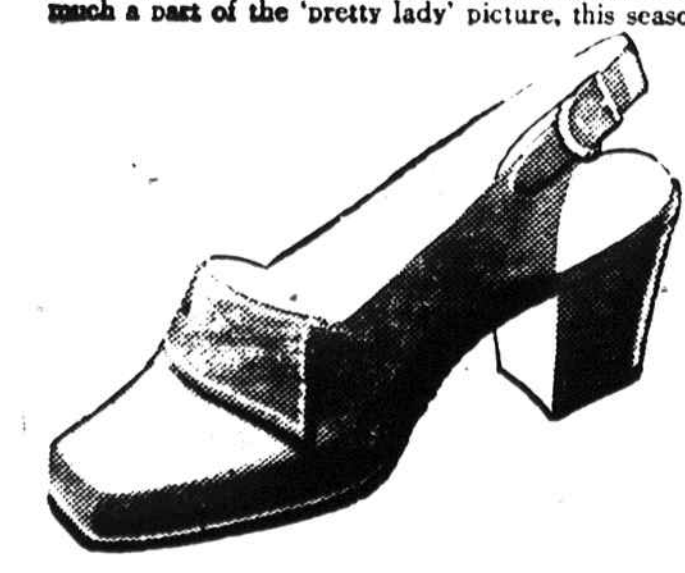
