INDIANS GRANT RIGHT-OF-WAY **FOR PARK ROAD**

CHEROKEE - R. Gety Browning, chief locating engineer for the state highway and public works commistion. said here Friday that he had negotiated with the tribal council of the Eastern band of Cherokee Indians for a right of-way for a road leading from the Blue Ridge Parkway to Black Camp Gap recreation area in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

The proposed route, agreed to by the tribal council new in session, will leave the parkway near Wolf Laurel, skirting that area and continuing on to the recreation area.

The road is one of the projects recommended by Western North Carolina Associated communities, Inc., jn its suggestions for expanded park and Parkway facalities.
