Jackson Gets \$8,774.16 From Beer and Wine Tax

Raleigh, December 1, A check for \$8,774.16 has been mailed to Jackson county as its share in the first distribution of income from increased taxes on beer and wine, according to information released folk, Va., last Sunday morning, by the State Department of Revenue. Of this amount \$8,580.23 was dervived from beer and \$193.93 for wine. Of this amount the town of Sylva received \$726.77.

> The 1947 legislature doubled the crown and stamp taxes on beer and unfortified wines and directed that half of the collections be distributed to counties, cities and towns which permit the sale of these beverages. The new tax rate went into effect July 1 and this first distribution of revenues is from collections for July, August and September. Future payments to local government units sharing in the tax will be made annually.
