J. B. ENSLEY SERVES PUBLIC AT AGE OF 85

Retired Merchant Is Teacher In Sylva Sunday School By LARRY W. MULL

John B. Ensley has been teaching a Sunday school class more than two decades, being one of the oldest teachers in the state in point of

Born Nov. 22, 1862, in Scotts Creek township of Jackson county, son of the late John and Cynthia Parris Ensley, he was reared on a farm and helped with the work from the time he was six or seven little impaired and his vision alyears old.

Mr. Ensley, retired Sylva merchant, recalls the time when the town of Sylva was founded in the year of 1879 by the late E. R. Hampton, who named it for William D. Sylva. "The first building to be erected in Sylva," Mr. Ensley said, "was the home of Mr. Hampton, who had set up a sawmill to manufacture lumber.

During his boyhood Mr. Ensley went with his father on wagon trips to Walhalla, Seneca and Anderson, S. C., taking produce to the markets in those towns and hauling back goods to merchants at Webstercounty seat of Jackson at that time. It took from eight days to two weeks to make these trips to market. He attended the public schools, a term of which lasted only about two or three months during the year. Being industrious, he spent a great part of his leisure time in reading, often burning "midnight oil" over his books.

Mr. Ensley has held many public offices. He has been road overseer, school committeeman, justice of the peace, member of the state house, and presidential elector at large. For a number of years he was chairman of the Republican Executive committee of his county, and was among the first presidents of the Jack on County Chamber of Commerce. He also served as deputy collector of revenue for the first district of North Carolina, comprising the counties of Buncombe, Haywood, Henderson, Transylvania, Polk, Jackson, Swain, Graham, Clay, Madison, Cherokee.
