FIRST: That the petitions presented to us requesting said election contain more than 15% of the duly qualified voters in and for the County and State aforesaid who voted for Governor in the last General Election;

SECOND: We find at the time of this meeting that more than 160 days have passed since the effective date of this Act as contained in the General Statutes of North Carolina for 1947, same being duly set forth and defined in Chapter 1084 thereof.

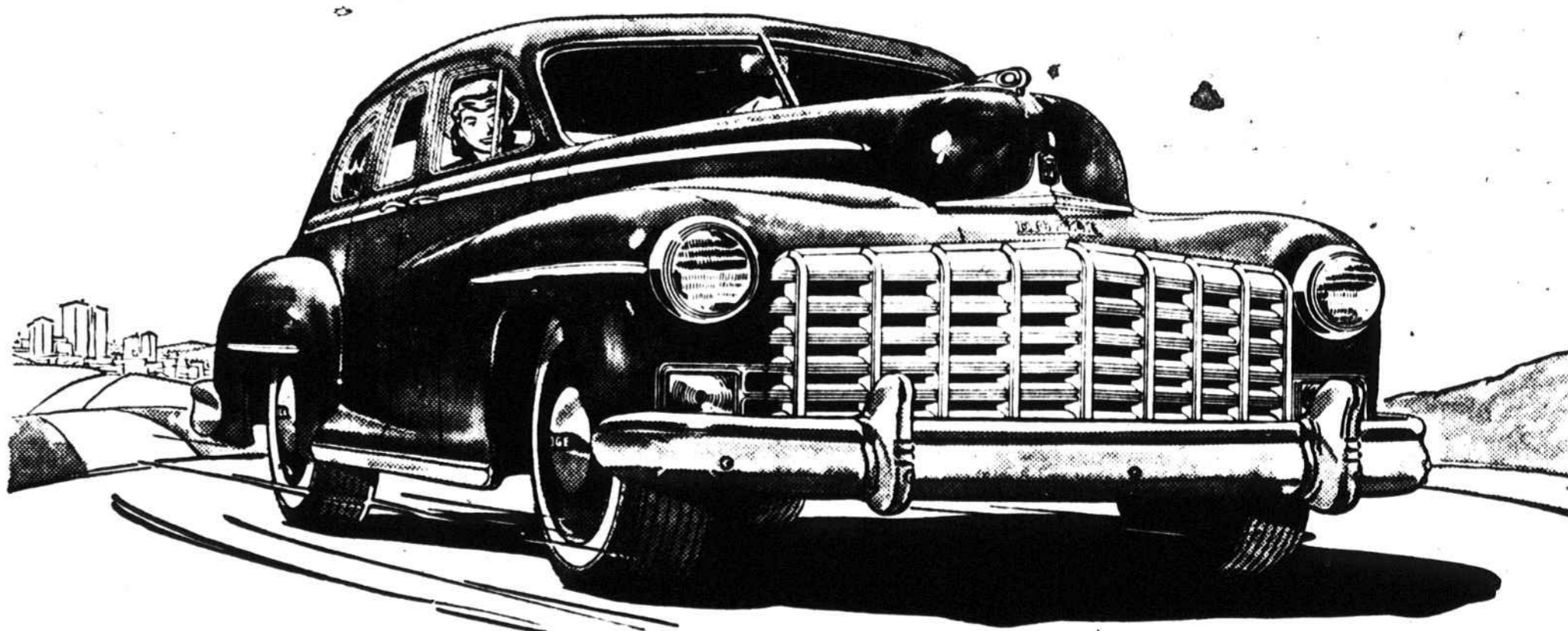
MEN BEST BY TEST
