We, the undersigned members of the County Board of Elections in and for the County and State aforesaid, in a special meeting duly called on this the 8th day of December, 1947, for the purpose of considering petitions this day duly filed before us, asking that an election be called in said county for the purpose of determining as to whether or not wine and beer shall be permitted to be sold, find the following facts: FIRST: That the petitions presented to us requesting said election contain more than 15% of the duly qualified voters in and for the County and State aforesaid who voted for Governor in the last General Election;

SECOND: We find at the time of this meeting that more than 160 days have passed since the effective date of this Act as contained in the General Statutes of North Carolina for 1947, same being duly set forth and defined in Chapter 1084 thereof; IT IS THEREFORE, upon motion duly made and seconded, unanimously ordered by said Board that an election be called for the County and State aforesaid, to be held on the 3rd day of February, 1948, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said County the question of the sale of Wine and Beer under the prescribed rules and regulations as defined by statute.

It is further ordered by said Board that the registration books for the purpose of conducting said election, be opened on the 10th day of January, 1948, and remain open for four Saturdays preceding said election, for the purpose of the registration of new voters. It is still further ordered that notice of this Election so called, be recorded on our Minute Books, that a copy of same be posted at the Court House door and three other public places in Jackson County, and that a copy thereof likewise be published in "The Sylva Herald" for 30 days preceding the opening of said registration books, as to give the qualified voters of said County full notice thereof by law required. Done in Special Session duly called, this the 8th day of December, 1947.

It has no concern, no anxiety, no interest, neutral—when good and evil are up for consideration, impartial, disinterested, without distinction or preference, careless, having no care, heedless, neglectful, unthinking, inattentive, careless of consequences. I don't care, it doesn't matter to me; it doesn't matter how it goes; if others can put up with it I can. What a muddled condition of mind—a bedarkened vision of future results! O, what a foe to progress, prosperity and safety is indifference. It keeps one from being sympathetic where sympathy is needed by those facing distress. This brings to mind a scriptural incident recorded in the 18th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles where the Jews and Greek quibbled and caviled about Paul's preaching. Galio drove them from the judgement seat and they beat and most cruelly treated one Sosthenes, a good man. And Galio, the governor, with the authority to prevent it, cared for none of

these things. So goes the role of the indifferent.

They stand off and say, it is none of my fight. They will even absent themselves from the church for lack of interest in the great things morally and spiritually for which the church stands. Many even show indifference in the house of worship. Some will snooze, others thumb their hymn books, some read the bulletin, if they have one, to see when and where the next social will be. Mind you, this goes on in many places while the pastor pours out his heart and soul preaching the gospel which is the only power of God unto salvation. Even there and then indifference takes a good share of the valuable time of worship.

Again when civic righteousness cries out for united effort to save our county, our homes, our children, born and unborn, how it behooves every true citizen—men and women—to cast off the shackles of indifference and play the part of good citizens. Won't you join heart and hand in this crusade against the legalized sale of wine and beer in Jackson county? The 3rd of February is the day when you can show your colors. Let not indifference to the right or carelessness to your best interest and the best interest to your county keep you from doing your moral and religious duty. God, save Jackson county from this immoral disgrace. What a happy day that would be. But if it is ever done, Christianity will have to do it.

Continued from page 1 stressed at this time and much improvement is underway. Many acres will be seeded and properly limed and fertilized within the next few weeks, which will add a great deal to the income of the veteran. With improved pastures, he not only will be adding to the value of the farm, but he is able to save much feed by having late and early grazing and be able to produce better cattle for the market.

We wish to bring to your attention some of the veterans who are doing outstanding work: Cecil Alexander, of Greens Creek is doing an excellent all-around job of farm improvement. He has acquired a number of pure breed short horn cattle that are doing nicely. He has a new home with all modern improvements, has just finished the construction of a new barn with concrete foundation; and is planning to build a modern poultry house this spring. He's seeded some two acres to alfalfa last fall and is seeding all land to cover crops.

Ralph Davis of Webster has done an excellent job with his farm. He is doing soil improvement practices that are showing excellent results. During the past year he has done an outstanding work on pasture improvement. Much clearing and fencing has been done and with some re-seeding and phosphate he will have a good pasture. The over-all picture is very encouraging and a great deal can be accomplished in a short time if we will only follow a few simple rules and take the time to put them into practice.
