Catamounts Beat Conference Leading Eastern Car., 57-43

McGinn, Barnhorst, Pressley Star In Cats 4th Conference Victory

Cullowhee, Feb. 9—Coach Tuck McConnell's Western Carolina Catamounts, who seem to have a knack for knocking off conference leaders, came through again tonight as they outgait the first place Eastern Carolina Teachers and came out with a 57-43 victory.

The Catamounts started out by grabbing a quick 12-1 lead and were never headed. Bobby McGinn, Howard Barnhorst and Clyde Pressley burned the baskets consistently throughout the game and, with point getting help from Bob Tate and Veo Rhodes, managed to hold on to the top part of the score. ECTC moved up to within three points of the Cats two times but both times their rally was cut short by quick Catamount baskets.

Howard Barnhorst turned in one of the best showings of ball handling and headwork that has been seen on a Catamount court for quite a while and gathered 12 points while doing so. McGinn came through with 17 points to move to within 20 points of his conference leading teammate, Bob Tate, who has a total of 236 points for 17 games. Clyde Pressley played an outstanding floor game as well as an offensive game as he matched Barnhorst's 12 points for runner

up in scoring. In the preliminary game, the Catamount "B" string handed Buck's Soda Shop their second straight defeat by a 54-46 count. Bob Claxton of Buck's was high man with 17 points while Collins collected 15 and Gregory 13 for the Grudgerites.

WESTERN CAROLINA TEACHERS TRIP EAST TENN., 60-55

McGinn And Tate Run Wild

Cullowhee, Feb. 7—The Western Carolina Teachers broke their losing streak here tonight by emerging on the top end of a 60-55 decision over the East Tennessee State cagers in a game that saw Bob McGinn and Bob Tate run wild and gather 47 points between themselves.

The game started out very slowly but the pace became more rapid as play progressed. During the first few minutes of the game both teams missed a lot of shots and neither team led by more than two points but the Catamounts took a 16-14 lead just before halftime and pushed it to 24-16 by intermission time.

The last half featured good ball handling on the part of both teams. McGinn went wild, burning the basket from everywhere and conference leading Tate, who has recently been in a slump, began to show his old form and soon the Cats held a 45-32 margin. The visitors staged a rally during the last few minutes but two quick baskets by McGinn and one by Tate cut the rally short and the Cats went on to win.

McGinn pushed 27 points through the hoop for the scoring honors while Tate rung up 20. Vest was the big shot for East Tennessee with 17.

In the preliminary game, the Catamount Jayvees beat Buck's of the Sylva City League, 33-27. Nub Davis sparked the Junior Cats with 12 points while Claxton of Buck's hit 11.
