

### ISSUES WARNING AGAINST ILLEGAL CORN DEALINGS

Raleigh, February 16—A warning against the use of illegal measures in the purchase and sale of corn has been issued by C. D. Baucom, superintendent of the Weights and Measures Division of the State Department of Agriculture.

Under North Carolina law, Baucom said, corn may be legally bought and sold only on the basis of the bushel measure when shelled. He also said the law stipulates that a bushel of shelled corn shall weigh 56 pounds.

Some corn buyers have been reported as making offers for unshucked corn on the basis that 81

pounds is equivalent to a bushel of shelled grain. Sales on such a basis usually mean a loss to the farmer, Baucom said, as almost any kind of corn will shell out more than a bushel of grain from 81 pounds in the shuck.

"It is unlawful," he continued, "to buy corn by the stand, basket, barrel, tub or hamper. Any person who buys corn by a measure which shells out more than the quantity represented by said measure is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment or both.

"Unfortunately the victims of illegal corn deals usually are tenant farmers, who can least afford a loss of their product. But the matter goes even further, for when a tenant sells corn on a short-measure basis, it may mean the landlord also will take a loss on the portion of the crop to which he is entitled. The fair and legal basis for transactions involving shelled corn is by the bushel weighing 56 pounds. When unshucked or on the cob, corn should be sold by weight without reference to how much the shelled grain will measure."

Stocks of feed grains in all positions on January 1, 1948 were relatively small, the Bureau of Agricultural Economics reports. Corn stocks of 1,567 million bushels were 29 per cent less than on January 1, 1947 and 24 per cent less than the average of the preceding 4 years.

### Feb. 28 Dead Line For Filing Farm Reports

Mr. D. C. Higdon, chairman of the Jackson county committee, states that an extension of time for the filing of Performance Reports under the Agricultural Conservation Program has been received. Instead of February 15 as a closing date, farmers in the county now have until February 28 in which to file a report on the practices carried out last year. Only about 50 percent of the farmers in the county have filed Performance Reports to date, whereas Mr. Higdon states that probably 2000 farmers have participated in the 1947 Program either by carrying out some of the practices or through the use of conservation materials. This extension of time will give these farmers a chance to come to the county office and complete their report on 1947 practices.

### Elon Takes Two From Catamounts

Elon's Christians won two vital North State conference games from Tuck McConnell's Western Carolina Catamounts last Friday and Saturday nights at Burlington, Friday by a 44-42 score in a game that went into an extra period and Saturday by a 46-37 count.

In the first game the Catamounts held a 21-17 lead at halftime and led on up until there was eight seconds to go when Elon's Smith hit a field goal that tied the game at 38-38. In the overtime period the Christians managed to think three goals to the Catamounts two for a two-point victory.

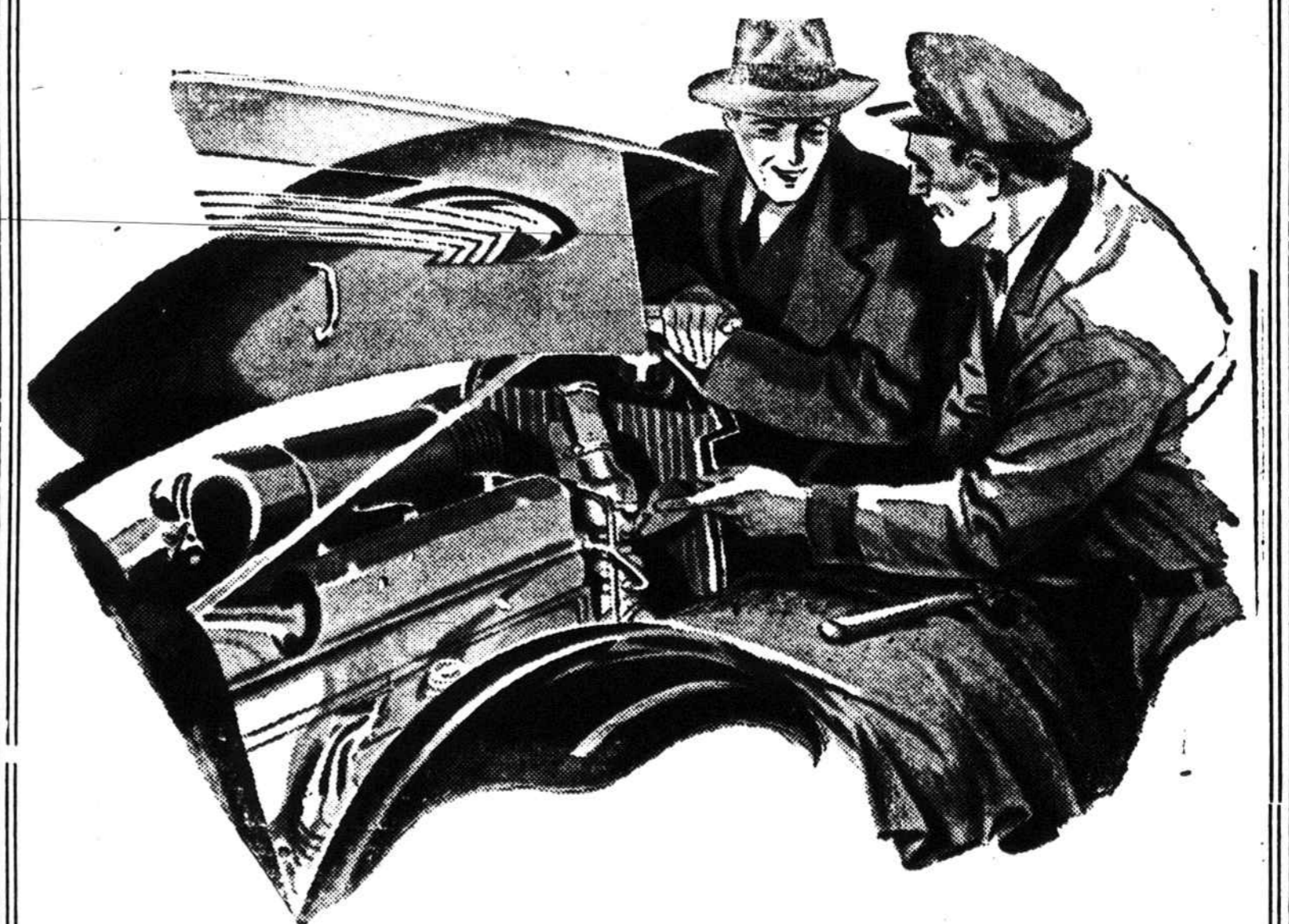
