Our School Building Program

In an effort to provide a county-wide school improvement program the board of education of Jackson County has made a detailed survey of the needs of all the schools of the county, a report of which has been published in The Herald prior to this time. It was stated at that time that a county school bond issue would be necessary IF the program is to be carried out, and that an election would soon be called for that purpose. The board now has prepared notice of, and it is published elsewhere in The Herald today, calling on the Board of Commissioners to provide funds for the school improvement program through the issuance of county bonds, paving the way for the vote of the people on the matter.

This notice specifies certain school districts in which school buildings are to be erected or repaired. This, however, is just about one-half of the school buildings of the county which will either be replaced with new buildings or have extensive repairs, additions and other improvements when the entire program gets underway.

· The board's hands are tied at present for lack of funds with which to do one thing for any of the schools. The only way that the board can ever start a program of building and improvement teacher, Jimmy Bales. in Canada, or any other township is through the bond issue. With the citizens voting for the bond issue then the board can start its program, and with money provided as State aid is made available probably next year, the program can be carried out to completion with every section of Jackson County benefiting.




