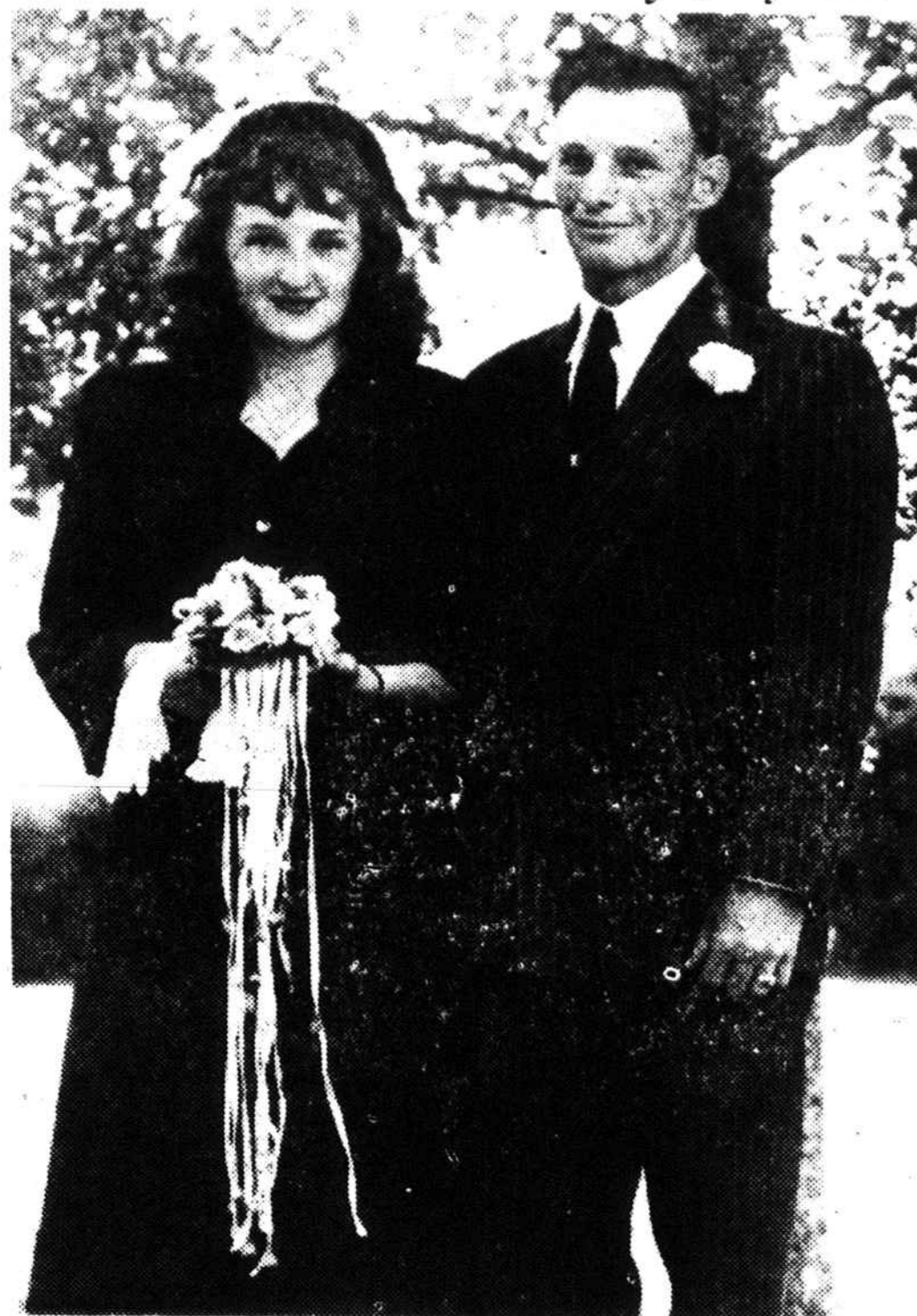
WEDDING ANNOUNCED
