STATE COLLEGE HINTS TO FARM HOMEMAKER

Cantaloups are plent ful this year and along with their appetizing color, flavor and texture, they are a good source of vitamin C. Those of deep yellow color also are a good scurce of vitamin A. Cantaloups today are sweeter and riper than they used to be. This is because of the newer trend toward picking riper and pre-cooling before shipping. Many cantaloups today are harvested at what growers call "full slip" — that is, when the stem breaks easily from the Glenville, a boy, July 31. vine indicating ripeness. At this stage the melons ripen easily to their full sweetness.

Iron with the grain of the fabric - it makes ironing easier, though the difference may be almost imperceptible. An even more important reason for ironing with the 23. grain is to keep bias-cut garments from sagging out of shape.

"Pressing" means to set iron 24. directly down upon fabrics and lift is directly upward without to July 24. and fro action. Wools must always be pressed to avoid distortion of 25. shape and damage to surface finish. Delicate laces, nets, and the July 26. like should also be pressed, lest the iron tear the delicate meshes. Use a pressing cloth.

Avoid "lost motion" when you iron — it causes fatigue. Avoid July 27. using a wobbly iron handle or a wobbly board for they increase "lost motion" and thus increase




