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repeating shotgun capable of holding more than three shells in the chamber and magazine combined unless such guns have the magazine plugged to reduce the total capacity of the gun to three shells. Five-shell guns are permitted in hunting deer and bear. Shotguns larger than 10 gauge are not permitted.

To kill doe deer. Minimum penalty, \$50.

To shoot at deer in water of depth above its knees.

To run deer with dogs during the closed season.

To hunt deer at night with artificial light. Minimum penalty, \$100.

To sell or buy game birds taken in the field. Minimum penalty, \$50 or 30 days imprisonment.

To bait upland game birds or migratory wildfowl.

To shoot from or across a highway or public road.

Mr. Snipes points out that the test-demonstration farms in Jackson county have spearheaded the agricultural advancement the county has made since 1935-36 when the first farms were selected for this work. Assuming rematerials and methods of farming as recommended by the extension service through the county agent, responsibility for trying out new these farms have performed a service for their neighbors and their county by proving the value of soil minerals in farm systems adjusted to their use. By thus taking much of the risk for the ordinary farmer out of recommended changes, they have made it easier for other farmers to change over to new practices which conserve and build the soil for a more stable agriculture in Jackson County.

Mr. Snipes gives these farms credit for influencing changes in agriculture in the county which have resulted in yields of all crops being rapidly increased. Farmers are now producing as much corn on one acre as they did at the beginning of the program on four acres. The acreage of improved pastures and soil-building crops have increased many times since the beginning of the program. These changes have taken place at an accelerated rate not only in Jackson county, but in all the counties where the test-demonstration program is being carried out.

To take hen turkeys.

All persons must be at least 16 years of age to hunt in wildlife management areas in National Forests.

Any person acting for hire as a hunting guide and receiving compensation as such, is required to obtain a guide's license in addition to his hunting, or trapping license. All guides are responsible for the behavior of their parties and are liable for cancellation of license and conviction for violators of the game law.

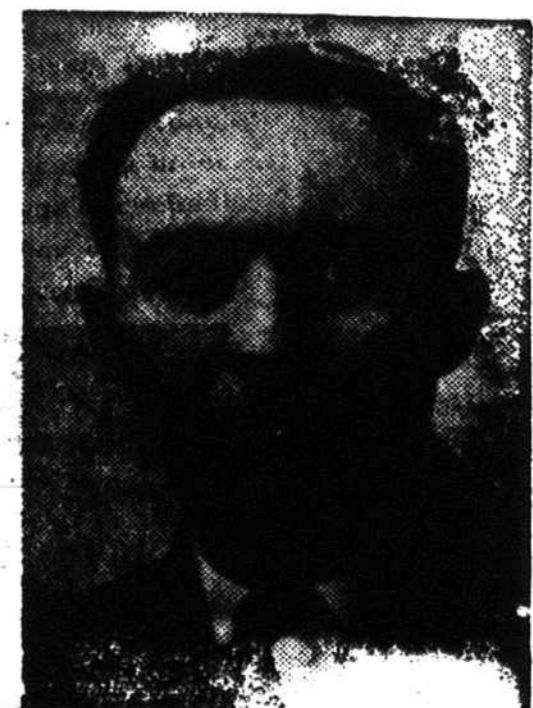
