Five thousand four hundred ninety-seven Jackson county persons had chest x-rays made during the county-wide chest x-ray survey conducted July 15 through August 20 by the State Board of Health in cooperation with the county board of health. The final report from the study of these xray pictures reveals that 76 n.w cases were found! Thirty-six of these revealed positive diagnosis; and 49 patients are to have further study with the x-ray, sputa analysis and tubercular skin test for final diagnosis.
